Discussing a JMP nowadays

- Super relevant research question
- Great data work
- GE effects through appropriate theory
- \Rightarrow It definitely wasn't the case back in the day!

The paper in a nutshell

Refugees face frictions in accessing host countries' labour market

- How so? Do work permits alleviate misallocation?
- In turn, how do work permits for refugees affect natives' labour markets?
 - Context: Syrian refugees to Jordan and 'Jordan Compact' in 2016
 - Both descriptive and reduced form evidence on the outcomes of Syrians and Jordanians...
 - ...and GE model of occupational choice

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The main results are:

- ➤ Syrians employment rate ↑ by 31 p.p. following Jordan Compact and wage gap narrows (10 p.p. in most recent years)
- ▶ Jordanians move to different occupation: selection induces relatively higher wages in high exposed markets
- Model rationalizes occupational mobility and (so far) allows to quantify frictions (↓ for refugees)

A crowded literature on refugees integration and yet...

The paper in the (expanding) literature on refugees:

- 1. Regarding integration
 - Fasani, Frattini and Minale (JEEA 2021, JEG 2022); Foged, Hasager and Peri (JOLE 2024); Arendt, Dustmann and Ku (Ox.Rev.EP 2022)
 - Not much in developing countries where most refugees are
- 2. Regarding impact on natives
 - Work permits are introduced after a long period of no integration
 - Non standard model in migration
- The paper provides a combination of reduced form & GE evidence in developing countries
 - Link well two research questions often studied in isolation
 - Policy relevance and new insights from the model

Ways forward

Already a paper with great potential. A few possible ways forward:

- 1. More nuance about misallocation
- 2. GE effects and mechanisms
- 3. A few more checks

1. On misallocation

- All based on optimal ex ante occupation: is it optimal ex post?
 - Downgrading could be rational (e.g., demand conditions differ)
 - Occupational switch are relatively few...
- Descriptively, show misallocation by profession post Jordan Compact
- ➤ Could we speak also of overqualification? (Although Fasani et al. (2021) find no effect on overqualification of refugees)

2. On GE effects and the model

- What drives Jordanians to upgrade their occupational skills? Just endogenous factors?
 - Could incentives to export following the Jordan Compact have a role? Maybe you can test them looking at exporting sectors
 - What about refugees consumption?
- Arellano-Bover and San (2024) and Caiumi and Simonsen (2025) show that firms matter for integration
 - You cannot address this...no questions on firm (e.g., size, tenure) in the LFS?
- How wages are determined in Jordan? No markdowns for Jordanians?
- Don't you need home production to have some value?

3. A few more checks

- Can you test 'standard' mechanisms in the migration literature?
 - E.g., internal mobility of both Syrian and Jordans? Jordanian women labour supply? Past-presence of Syrians (co-ethnic network)? Return migration?
- Explore different specifications (occupational shares must change with lift of the ban): probability of employment/non-empl.?
- Wages are sector-specific: is there really limited mobility across sectors/occupation?

Minor comments

- Exploit the various component of the Jordan Compact more (e.g., agriculture in 2016)? Other integration policies?
- In the model, name 'Occupation 1' and 'Occupation 2' (formal/informal, high/low skill)
- Use distance from the border in your reduced form in an IV framework
- Exposition:
 - Formal/informal is a bit lost in the central part of the paper, but could be helpful to the reader
 - Refugees' gap narrows (it does not close)
